Our new year has started off so well with all of our amazing children demonstrating our I Aspire values across the curriculum. We have welcomed new pupils, our Reception classes have settled quickly and are thriving, and new staff already feel like they have been here for years. Our I Aspire focus has been Independence this term, something

that we have seen demonstrated in abundance already.



We have fitted a lot into the first few weeks. A huge thank you for everyone who contributed to our food collection for our Harvest Festival we sent so much to the Food Bank that we filled an entire car with boxes and bags. We are waiting to find out how many families our donations will be supporting, once it has all been logged in. Our Worship team met with a volunteer from the Foodbank who explained to them how the donations

are used. The team are going to be asking for further donations next month, focusing on selection boxes and chocolate gifts that can be given to families in the run-up to Christmas - more information to follow soon.

We have a variety of after-school clubs running this term that we had a huge interest in. We love that we are able to offer the children these additional opportunities and I am very grateful to the teachers for giving their time to run

these throughout the year. We are also pleased to share that we have been award a National Quality Mark for Religious Education. The REQM assessor gave us the silver award for the high-quality teaching and learning of Re in our

school. We are extremely proud of what we offer our pupils and this recognition is wonderful. Special thanks to Mrs Connors and Mrs Lightfoot for their continued hard work in this area.

After the break we will be starting a updated curriculum in certain subject areas. Rather than continuing with our connected curriculum we are going to be looking at subjects on a more individual basis. We are very excited by this as it has allowed us to plan for some really new and exciting topics in ever year group. Our website will be updated very soon to show our curriculum overview, so you can see what your children will be learning every term.

It has been great to see so many parents in school already this year. Y6 parents for the Y7 transition meetings and YR and Y1 parents who joined us to learn more about phonics teaching. It was wonderful to see so many people here earlier in the week for Parent Evenings too. I hope you found them useful. As I write this, I am very much looking forward to Fantastic Finish Friday, where you can share the learning journey of this half-term with your children.

SAFEGUARDING INFORMATION FOR PARENTS/CARERS

WITH THE SPARKS **STAY SAFE!**

As autumn arrives, you may be tempted to hold your own bonfire or fireworks display. It's always safer to go to an official display, but remember the following advice if you do hold your own. Fireworks are fun but pose a danger if mishandled or misused.

Make sure you • Follow manufacturer instructions carefully and read them in the day or by torchlight, never a naked flame Never go back to a firework once it has been lit, and never throw a firework or put it in your pocket . Light fireworks at arm's length, using a safety firework lighter or fuse wick, and stand well back • Collect fireworks after a display with care. Douse them with water and dispose of them properly in a metal container Follow these safety tips and enjoy a safe time this bonfire night.

PARKING

Can we remind parents that the school car park entrance is **NOT** to be used for dropping off children or turning around in. There are many pedestrians in the area, both at the start and the end of school and we want to ensure there are no serious accidents. We ask that parents consider the local residents and DO NOT block entrances/driveways, or park too close to junctions or the roundabout Causing obstructions on the roadside is dangerous and may lead to a collision. There are plenty of spaces in the car park close to the local shop, alternatively park slightly further away and walk the short distance to the school gates.

Parents are also asked not to park outside school during school class hours and watch/or film their children at playtime. We have had several reports of parents/carers having

conversations through the fence with their children at lunchtime or break times, and we ask that you do not disturb the pupils during the school Thank you!





Year 1 News

Year 1 started their first week back with a WOW week, when a dinosaur appeared in the playground. The children completed lots of different activities all involving dinosaurs. Finally, they created their own dinosaurs and used adjectives to describe them. The children particularly enjoyed making their own moving dinosaurs using split pins.





In English, we have been looking at journey stories. The children worked hard to learn the text map of The Baby Mouse . The children have all created their own versions of the story by changing the characters and adding adjectives to make their writing more interesting. We have also been learning a class poem, hand on the bridge by Michael Rosen, and we have added our own actions.

In Maths, we have continued to develop the children's fluency in numbers, sorting, counting objects, and comparing. The children are becoming confident in using a range of manipulatives to support work, including ten frames, counters and Rekenrek frames.

In our Connected curriculum lessons, we have been looking at toys from the past and present. We discussed toys that they played with as babies. The children have looked at Pieter Bruegel's art work of toys. They used his work as inspiration and drew their own versions. Finally, the children have looked at the history of Lego and how Ole Kirk Christiansen founded the popular brand. The children enjoyed watching an animation on the history behind Lego.

Year 2 News


Well done Year 2, we have completed our first term! The children have risen to every challenge and new experience.

To celebrate her service we created a beautiful piece of artwork using watercolours.



It has been a very busy term and we have learned many new things.



Connected Curriculum - Why do we see? How do we hear?

In Science we have learnt how humans are able to see and how they hear. We have learnt that light travels in a straight line and bounces off objects into our eyes. Both classes have tested different materials to see which would be the best to create curtains from so that a person could get a good night's sleep.

Maths

Place value has been our focus this term. We have been exploring numbers up to 10,000. We have learnt how to round to the nearest 10, 100 and 1,000. We have also been using Base 10 and place value counters to help us understand the value of each digit!



English

In English, we have been writing portal stories. The children have had to take their character to a new world through a special portal and try to make sure they get back alive.

We have learnt how to use adjectives, commas in a list, prepositions, similes and lots of new exciting vocabulary.

MOON ROCK

Yes you're right! Year 4 have touched Moon rock this term! We had an incredible afternoon observing and touching rocks/meteorites. The children held moon rock and all managed to get a picture with it. As well as this, one of the rocks was 14 million years old. How incredible is that?
